Save the date—April 11-12! The Program Committee is very excited about the AAUW Iowa 2014 Spring Conference, **Blooming for a Century: Thriving in the Future**. We will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Des Moines Branch and recognizing the anniversaries of other branches with a parade of branches attired in clothes of the year their branches began.

Friday promises to be a fun and productive day. Everyone is invited to work from 1 to 3 PM on a service project, Move the Food, whose goal is to serve the hungry. Later that afternoon there will be a by-invitation-only reception for Legacy Circle members, past state presidents, and current branch presidents sponsored by AAUW National.

The evening will be a gala celebration at the historic Hoyt Sherman Place. Janet Heineke has organized an art show of AAUW Iowa members' works. The story is fascinating and she is an excellent presenter.
