AAUW lowa Spring Conference – Building a More Inclusive World. The AAUW lowa spring conference promises to be one that will be stimulating. Given our political climate, we believe that we are spot on with a conference that invites diversity and inclusion. We have some great speakers that will leave you inspired and ready for action. We will also have some opportunities to react to presentations from the panel during round table discussions, and then take the first steps toward applying ideas to your own branches and communities. We hope that you will make it a point to come join us in Cedar Rapids, April 29-30. Members of the Cedar Rapids branch promise that there will be interesting things to do in their community before or after the conference.

Women's March. The Women's March on Washington was a nonpartisan event that emphasized women's rights and those of all people, especially people who have been marginalized. AAUW endorsed the Women's March on Washington, and AAUW lowa supported the sister march in Des Moines. The organizers of the march had originally expected about 2,000 people, but as the date got closer, it was clear that the crowd would be larger than that. The rally was moved from inside the capitol building to a stage area on the west side of the capitol building. The Des Moines Register estimated a crowd of about 26,000 attended the march and rally. The mood at the event was peaceful but energetic.

It would be inaccurate to characterize the march as a protest. Participants were marching for women's rights, for members in our society who have been marginalized, and for our environment, and not against any leader in or out of government. The signs we saw and the chants were heard were about the need to support all of our people.

We appreciated the members and friends who stopped by our table. In the coming weeks, there will continue to be calls for action on issues that affect women and families. I urge you to sign up for the AAUW Action Network, use the 2-Minute Activist, and look for opportunities to make a difference.

Highway 30 westbound

Ron Corbett is the mayor of Cedar Rapids. He graduated from Cornell College in Mount Vernon, Iowa. Ron was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives in 1986, where he served 7 terms. He was elected mayor of Cedar Rapids in 2009.

Dr. Eden Wales Freedman is an Assistant Professor of English and the Director of Diversity Studies at Mount Mercy University. She is also an affiliate Assistant Professor of Women's Studies at the University of New Hampshire. Her work focuses on intersections of race, gender, trauma, and oppression.

Cordy Galligan is the vice president of Marketing and Communications with AAUW. She has a degree from Catholic University, and has a wealth of experience in business and fundraising for non-profit organizations.

Mary Gesing is a Counselor at Kirkwood Community College in the Dean of Students Office. Amanda Thompson is the Accommodation Services and Assistive Technology Specialist in the Department of Learning Services at Kirkwood Community College.



Memorium for Past Leaders

We remember three women who led AAUW Iowa as president and who were influential leaders in their respective branches.

Roberta Davidson was a member of the Cedar Rapids branch and AAUW Iowa president from 1970-72. Davidson died at age 89 on April 12, 2015. At the time she was survived by Robert, her husband of 67 years, as well as two sons and four grandchildren.

Mary Elizabeth Sievert was a member of the Davenport-Bettendorf branch and served as AAUW lowa president from 1986-88. She died on December 28, 2016 at age 77. Mary is survived by her companion J. P. Whitaker.

Betty Durden was a member of the Des Moines branch. She organized and chaired Governor Ray's Iowa Commission on the Status of Women, was the state chair of ERA Iowa to add women to the constitution, established the program of Continuing Education for Women at Drake University, and was president of AAUW Iowa from 1996-98. She died on February 20, 2017.

UPDATE on STATUS of State/Branch Bylaws

Branch bylaws: All AAUW branches across the nation had to have a revised copy of their branch bylaws uploaded to the AAUW website by January 31, 2017. All AAUW Iowa branches received a REVISED copy of their branch bylaws on November 30, 2016 with instructions on how to upload them to the MSD section of the website. **State bylaws:** AAUW Iowa bylaws have been revised and uploaded to the AAUW website as well as the state website. **Affiliate Agreements:** All branches also must have <u>signed</u> affiliate agreements on file on the AAUW website. These two documents are <u>legal</u> documents showing branch and state affiliation with national AAUW. Make sure your branch bylaws and affiliate agreements have been sent to AAUW.

Item of business at Annual Business meeting:

A motion was made in April 2016 to table discussion and action on a motion to add to the state bylaws a Section in Article VI. Officers, dealing with <u>Removal from Office</u>. That motion will be brought back before the meeting for action. A motion to **withdraw** the 2016 motion from any further action was approved by the Board to be presented at the 2017 meeting.

MOTION: The Bylaws committee <u>moves to **withdraw** the motion</u> made at the April 2016 Business Meeting under Article VI. Officers –Section 1 – Officers and Directors – Section 3. Terms of Office to add an item c. entitled <u>Removal</u> <u>From Office</u>. "An officer or director of the Board may be removed for any or no reason by a two-thirds vote at an inperson meeting of the state Board of Directors in accordance with policies and procedures adopted by AAUW."

<u>Rationale</u>: In the latest mandates from AAUW, this statement is no longer required – therefore, the bylaws committee wishes to withdraw the motion.
