President's Letter

Your co-presidents, Kathie Farris and I, have enjoyed collaborating with AAUW members in the state via Zoom—thanks to Lois Enger, Website Director. (The Zoom meetings she hosts are keeping us safer from COVID and saving funds that can instead be used to further our key goals this year.) In our meetings and discussions, the AAUW Iowa board chose focus issues for 2022-2023, approved a budget to accomplish goals, and initiated action toward them. The three areas we're working on this year:

- Ensuring women's rights (e.g., human trafficking, ERA, reproductive rights)
- Reducing gun violence
- Supporting public education (e.g., diverse curriculum, teacher support, LGBTQ)

Please feel free to share with us your ideas for action on these issues.

Collaborations with the branches have informed and encouraged us, too. The year's meetings with branch presidents are continuing the superb Zoom communication initiated by former AAUW IA president Carletta Knox Seymour but now with one-hour meetings. So far these monthly Virtual Town Hall meetings with branch presidents have fostered discussion of AAUW IA's public policy program, membership concerns, and fundraising



ideas. In November, we took ideas from Maggie Tinsman on supporting her statewide initiative against human trafficking.

Kathie and I are meeting bimonthly with presidents of other upper Midwest states and liaisons to the national board, sharing our concerns and issues with them. At the regional level, planning for the Midwest Regional Conference in St. Louis, October 19-21, is now beginning.

The ultimate collaboration—the annual conference of lowa members in April—will also focus on our three critical issues. Read about conference options below and make plans to attend. Together we can take action to share our perspective with fellow lowans across the state.

AAUW Iowa Lobby Day February 8

Sixteen members of AAUW were joined by four guests and **opposed** to the following bills that were discussed:

Representatives Sue Cahill, Elinor Levin, Art Staed, and Adam Zabner for Lobby Day on February 8. Highlights included information from Maggie Tinsman about the need for a safe harbor bill that would create a youth safe harbor task force, increase victim service funding, and enact an expungement process to clear the records of survivors of human trafficking an prevent further victimization. Maggie was joined by Chelsea Hoye, a lobbyist for the Iowa Network Against Human Trafficking and Slavery, and by Renee Connor, a survivor of human trafficking. Mary Ann Ahrens reported to members about plans to print and distribute a brochure about human trafficking to increase awareness.

Members expressed our disappointment in the passage of HF68, the bill that would use taxpayer dollars to fund education savings accounts to provide tuition in private schools.

There was also a discussion about some upcoming bills. AAUW members who were present were generally

• HF03 would put strict limits on the kinds of food SNAP recipients could use their benefits to buy.

- HF05 would require school boards of public and charter schools to publish information online about the modifying the social studies curriculum in advance, making it difficult for teachers to respond to current events quickly.
- SF14 would re-establish the death penalty.
- SF85 would restrict activities that relate to socialemotional learning.
- SSB1037 would remove requirements for gender balance on appointed boards and committees.
- SF2139 would adopt rules on the use of Hebrew scripture and the Bible in an elective Social Studies course.
- HSB126 would restructure and consolidate state government.

Members sought out their own representatives and senators after meeting together as a group.

Coalition for a More Just Iowa Sponsors Tik-Tok Contest

One Human Family, a group of citizens in the Quad Cities who are interested in furthering social justice issues, reached out to other Iowa organizations in 2022 to review concerns about Iowa becoming a place that is actively hostile toward justice and civil rights issues. Members of AAUW participated in some zoom conversations about "Iowa Is Better Than This" to determine what could be done to influence our neighbors to move to a more "Iowa Nice" direction. That effort became the Coalition for a More Just Iowa.

At a recent meeting with the coalition, it was announced that the One Human Family has received a Puffin grant. The coalition decided to use those funds to encourage young people to use their technology skills to communicate messages about political engagement to counter reactionary messages. This is an opportunity for your young friends and family members to communicate a positive message to other lowans., and earn a \$300 prize.

From a statement from One Human Family:

Iowa state government is becoming increasingly reactionary on issues important to most Iowans – especially younger Iowans. One Human Family QCA (OHFQCA), together with the Coalition for a More Just Iowa, seeks to change that narrative by engaging more young people in the political process. To that end, OHFQCA is offering five \$300 prizes for the best and most viewed short-form videos by Iowans 26-and-under highlighting one or more of the following progressive issues:

- 1. Increased Funding for Public Education
- 2. Valuing Human Lives over Gun Rights
- 3. Iowa Needs Immigrants/protecting the rights of refugees
- 4. Women's Reproductive Rights
- 5. Support for LGBTQ Rights.

"I think there are a lot of young lowans out there who are passionate about these issues and who are extremely creative," says OHFQCA Co-Chair, Rev. Rich Hendricks. "We would love for the contest to go viral and draw more attention to these important issues. Of course, everyone is welcome to make a video and use our hashtag – the more the merrier! The prizes, however, are only available to lowa students/ residents aged 26 and under."

Co-Chair Rabbi Henry Karp says, "We can't wait to see the amazing videos that young lowans come up with." The contest is made possible in part by a grant from The Puffin Foundation. Readers are invited to be creative and to share news of the contest with their peers.

A OHFQCA-created video promoting the contest is planned to be released soon.
